School Workshops

Words, Words: Utilizing a specific piece of Shakespearean text, we'll dissecting it to get a better understanding of what it is saying and how to go about delivering it.

Shakesplay!: A week long theater arts experience providing young people with a fun, safe, supportive and creative environment to explore their since of performance through the devising of a complete work of William Shakespeare. (Suitable for ages 6-17)

Mad Lib Monologues: An introductory class experience in which the students watch a short performance, discuss the work and its relevance, then create some content within a Shakespearean framework, using some of their own words, and read it back to the class.

Clown/Physical Theater Workshop: Games and collaborative exercises to get the students out of their heads and into their bodies.
