# Exploring visual storytelling through composition and storyboarding

"Shape Stories" is a two-part lesson. In the first part we will create simple cut-out shapes and explore various compositions with them. By drawing on the imagination we will begin to create characters and potential story ideas. In the second part we will storyboard three frames each representing the beginning, middle, and ending of our story. This lesson is designed to inspire children to further explore writing and illustrating their own stories.

<u>Materials:</u> Color construction paper or found paper, white copy paper, scissors, pencil, white school glue or glue stick, common household objects used as drawing templates

## **The Lesson:**

- 1. Self-introduction, project overview, and materials.
- 2. **Part 1: Character Play.** Find objects in your home you can trace.
- 3. Cut out a variety of shapes using different colored papers.
- 4. Think about each shape as a *character* in a story.
- 5. Move them around on the blank page as you envision how they might interact with one another. Discuss meaning of *composition* and *negative space*.
- 6. **Part 2: Storyboarding.** Cut out two additional identical shapes for each of your chosen characters.
- 7. Lay three sheets of blank paper next to each other as story *panels*. Discuss *sequence*.
- 8. Decide the beginning, middle and end of your story.
- 9. Choose the best ways to *illustrate* this sequence with your chosen shape characters.
- 10. If you need to cut out additional *props*, do so now.
- 11. Glue down the shapes once your *storyboarding* is complete.
- 12. Show examples of storyboards used for various projects, including books, movies, and television.
- 13. Challenge the students to continue exploring forms of *visual storytelling*.

Connection to Literacy: "Shape Stories" connects to literacy through the exploration of several vocabulary words including composition, negative space, character, sequence, panels, visual storytelling, props, illustration, and storyboard. The second part of the lesson explores the idea of story structure, as we will be creating three storyboards that describe the beginning, middle, and end of a simple visual story. I will be giving them step-by-step instructions, so listening to and following directions will be emphasized as well. I will also include slides that can be read that list materials required, as well as simplified step-by-step written instructions.
